Eyes on the prize

It's been a chilly year for NGOs working in our field of information and communication technologies for development and human rights. Many of our partners have been struggling to match the new opportunities opening up with the necessary sources of funding. Despite some anxious moments, OneWorld's ten centres have found ways to consolidate, and in some cases, even to expand. OneWorld South Asia has tripled its team to 30 people and is pushing the boundaries of our Open Knowledge Network to link its approach to sharing local knowledge with that of scores of like-minded partner projects across the sub-continent. OneWorld Africa is connecting up more and more community radio stations to share programming over the net. OneWorld Spain has partnered with Canal Solidario to form Spain's premiere online service to civil society. And all the centres are working with our 1,600 partner organisations to highlight the best of their web pages in our local editions and languages.

We have been particularly gratified with the response we've had from you, our audience. In terms of raw numbers, we ended the year with close to three quarters of a million unique visitors to our family of sites in the month of March. And when we looked more closely, the results of the latest audience survey showed that of the survey respondents, more than half visited the site weekly and a quarter of those visited us every day. Perhaps even more striking is the fact that 48% of them said they had taken some kind of action as a result of reading our pages. We are really encouraged by this degree of engagement in our readers, and in the coming year, we hope to build on that sense of involvement with more interactivity on the site and more links to campaigns that people can get involved with.

This was also the year of WSIS - the World Summit on the Information Society held in Geneva in December 2003: an opportunity for civil society to make a splash. OneWorld made the most of it, with 3 exhibition stands and participation in dozens of workshops and seminars. We also used the occasion for the public launch of OKN, about which the distinguished social and environmental pioneer, Professor Swaminathan, said: "I consider this to be the single most meaningful event at WSIS. We are very happy to be partners in this exciting adventure to include

the excluded and voice the voiceless in shaping the digital destiny of rural India." Aside from civil society, the vision and potential of ICTs seemed to be promoted less by the political leaders and more by the private sector. In our own case, our new partnership with the Vodafone Group Foundation is pointing the way to one of the most exciting new opportunities opening up for ICTs in the global south - the mobile phone revolution.

Take four typical Sub-Saharan African countries. How many people would you say made a phone call in the last month? Asked to guess the percentage, covering both urban and rural areas, most people suggest around 5%. In fact, the astonishing answer, according to Gamos, is 80%. A mobile phone revolution is happening in Africa that none of us predicted. And it is forcing us to rethink what the most appropriate tools are for people to communicate and share information in the developing world. Mobile phone use is simply exploding in the global south. In Kenya, fixed line phones were stuck for years at around 200,000. Today there are 2.4 million users of mobiles. And in India, the mobile handset market has grown by 568% in the last year. So, once more, OneWorld is evolving to take account of these new realities. Such evolutions have been a characteristic of our nine-year history, as we have sought to stay in the forefront of whatever systems and services can offer the most in the cause of justice for all. This is prize on which we must keep our eyes focused.

OWA has been engaged in activities on the transition to an independent and autonomous centre of the network. This included consolidation and promotion of the new programme, locally and regionally, by networking and collaborating with strategic partners, including government and the private sector. OWA convened and participated in national and regional conferences on ICT policy and strategic use of ICTs by civil society, and continued capacity building and training of community broadcasters and NGOs on internet broadcasting and publishing.

OWA collaborated with OWSA on the Southern Development Programme which includes the Digital Opportunity Channel, with UMAL, OWSA and OWI on the management of the Southern Voices Online 2 project, with OWI and OWSA on OKN and with OWI on OW Radio.

OWA provides a voice for marginalised communities through the net, radio and OKN by helping policy makers and decision takers know the issues from the ground so that they can influence decisions that impact peoples' lives regarding poverty, HR and SD. We facilitate access to relevant information on health, education, governance, poverty alleviation, etc., to communities so they know how to tackle their problems or who to go to for assistance on various issues. *Priscilla Jere, Director*

Based in Montreal, the Centre is hosted by Alternatives (www.alternatives.ca), and is funded by the Canadian International Development Agency as well as Canadian trade unions and individuals. Partnership has grown steadily after a Fall 2003 recruiting drive, and continues to expand as One World Canada increases its reach. *Lila Train, Director*

In the past year, UMAL has seen a considerable change in staffing, in name and in partnership. A single project coordinated by one person has evolved into a centre with 3 staff members. Due to a language barrier in the primarily Spanish speaking region, OneWorld Latin America changed its name officially to UnMundo América Latina, the name chosen by partners voting on the website. One of UMAL's biggest successes in the past year has been strengthening relationships with its partners, and the increase in partnerships from 105 to nearly 300. In October 2003, UMAL held 5 very successful and well attended capacity building workshops in Central America on Dgroups and on the uses of UMAL's portal.

Since December 2003, UMAL has been implementing the Cultural Channel project, which has included: forming a network with three cultural organisations from Costa Rica,

Honduras, and El Salvador, initiating a virtual community with cultural actors from the five Central American countries to strengthen articulation of the cultural sector and validate the channel, and building the technological platform, graphic design and content for the channel. The channel will be "live" online later this year. Also in December 2003, UMAL participated in the World Summit for the Information Society in Geneva and in a Latin American electronic list of organisations involved in the Communication Rights in the Information Society.

In March 2004, UMAL's partnership manager visited El Salvador to build relationships with partners and with other civil society organisations interested in membership with UMAL. Also in March, a visit to India allowed UMAL to bring website software from the Ek Duniya project of OneWorld South Asia and adapt it for the 10 websites for UMAL partners in Central America. These were completed in August 2004. A Central American tour is planned in May to train organisations on this software, as well as hold partner meetings with the objective of meeting with strategic partners and discussing their national contexts, UMAL's strategic directions, and how UMAL can strengthen relationships with certain partners in the region, focusing on priority thematic sectors. This tour will be the first step in a three-year process to increase partner involvement and appropriation of the UMAL Centre.

The UMAL portal has changed considerably as well. The news edition is now updated daily in Spanish, English, Portuguese and French, and with the volunteer editors project, the site now contains 9 Country Guides (6 in Spanish and 3 in English) and 3 Topic Guides. It is also planned to complete an English version for the Migration, El Salvador and Costa Rica guides. Institutionally, the development of a full centre has meant more active participation within the OW network with regard to governance, decentralisation and sustainability.

It has been a year of change at OneWorld Spain. The merging process with the portal, Canal Solidario, a

project of Fundacion Chandra, culminated last May with the launch of the joint site, Canal Solidario-OneWorld, in Spanish and Catalan. The site has now many new features, like online interviews, agenda of events, broad spanish NGO directory and weblogs. More than 30,000 people subscribe to our weekly newsletter and our partnership base is currently formed by more than 180 NGOs. We are trying to multiply the impact of our work through syndication agreements with different media, and we work with NGOs to strengthen their communication skills and with journalists to provide them with tools and sources to improve their coverage of social issues. As a result of the merging process, the team of CanalSolidario-OneWorld España now comprises six full-time journalists based in two offices in Madrid and Barcelona, and the project is hosted by Fundación Chandra (www.fundacionchandra.net), a non-profit organisation, which has been working since 1999 to harness the potential of ICT to promote social action and sustainable development, with the financial support of Fundació Un Sol Món (www.unsolmon.org). *Carlota Franco, Director*

OneWorld Finland is an independent non-profit organisation based in Helsinki. We have 31 partners, including many of the leading NGOs in Finland and the Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

In August 2003, OneWorld Finland, Amnesty International Finnish Section, Finnish League for human rights and Finnish UN Association started a joint project "ihmisoikeudet.net" (ihmisoikeudet = Human Rights). The goal of the project was to create a website on Human Rights targeted at secondary and senior high school students and teachers. Ihmisoikeudet.net is an online textbook including articles, exercises and models on how people can participate in Human Rights work. The site was launched on January 23 and the feedback from the schools has been very positive.

Before the WSIS Summit in Geneva, OW Finland compiled a special section on the Information Society. Later this section was enlarged to form the Information Society and

It leads the South East Europe project (www.oneworld.net/see), aimed to create a SEE OneWorld Centre.

Further, Unimondo, along with its partners, organised some conferences and events, like the World Social Agenda 2003 in Padua and 2004 in Trentino (www.worldsocialagenda.org).

Currently Unimondo board is doing a deep analysis of strategic development lines and sustainability issues to become a more influential site. *Mauro Cereghini, Director*

In 2003, OneWorld.nl addressed its programme in the following ways:

- **By providing news, in-depth reports and discussions on OneWorld.nl.** The website was visited 610,000 times (with a monthly average of 51,000). The number of page views was 2,700,000 (with a monthly average of 225,000 viewed pages and 4.4 pages per person). Our number of visitors showed an increase of 16% compared to 2002. Furthermore, the number of viewed pages rose to 30%. All in all, this amounts to 117% visitors and 223% viewed pages since the year we started keeping website statistics.
- **By maintaining a network of NGOs.** The number of OneWorld.nl members grew from 89 to 101.
- **Through producing campaign websites aimed at raising public awareness.** OneWorld.nl co-initiated a

campaign centred around the World Summit on the Information Society, which included a public event and a website providing news and human rights and sustainable development related documents. In addition, we launched an online marketplace to support sustainable product chains. Furthermore, OneWorld successfully carried out nine projects under the authority of third parties. *Peter van Lier (editor-in-chief, Director as of 2003/4)*

OneWorld South Asia (OWSA), after being in existence for four years, revisited its strategy and resolved to shift its overall emphasis towards promoting grassroots communication to strengthen the voice of the poor and the marginalised. Towards this, four major programme areas were identified: communication for development, action research, pro-poor ICT policy advocacy and grassroots communications supported by partnership coordination and capacity building.

One of OWSA's pioneering steps in this direction was generation of local knowledge in the Tamil language by the local community, which is then disseminated through All India Radio (AIR) and local language newspapers in southern India. In collaboration with the MS Swaminathan Research Foundation (MSSRF) and as a part of the Open Knowledge Network (OKN) project (see details on page 13) this initiative provides people at the grassroots, opportunities to communicate locally relevant knowledge in local languages at an affordable cost to nearly 0.1 million people living in a radius of 200 km.

One more step to enable grassroots voices to be heard was the initiation of a DFID-supported action research project in Nigeria, Croatia, Pakistan and India to study the relevance of ICTs in pro-poor public service delivery. In addition, the Digital Opportunity channel and Learning Channel.org, two other global products emanating from OWSA, introduced several interactive platforms for advocating policy changes aimed at reducing poverty.

OWSA also continued to expand its partnership base from 224 to 276 organisations during this period. At its annual

partnership meeting, representatives of over 100 NGOs from the sub-continent agreed to work together to achieve the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). The partners, at several other consultations, further reinforced the value of the OWSA partnership in promoting peer-to-peer networking and promoting grassroots voices in the national and international arena.

Besides, the South Asia edition of OneWorld.net disseminated quality information on development issues gleaned from partner NGOs. And OWSA's syndication service to the Yahoo! World News section, Indo-Asian News Services (EIANS) and Hindustan Times.com mainstreamed the key development challenges of the region.

In technical collaboration with Mahiti InfoTech, OWSA initiated the 'EkDuniya' project - the local language content hosting and communication platform for NGOs, primarily in South Asia. Also, as part of its capacity building programme, OWSA conducted six training programmes aimed at introducing ICT tools among civil society groups and two workshops for training women journalists on new media.

Finally, OWSA was registered as an Indian trust with three eminent persons as the founding trustees of the organisation. *Basheerhamad Shadrach, Director*

OneWorld SEE is a multimedia and multilingual portal for civil society organisations in South East Europe. Currently a project of Unimondo, it is expected to become an independent OneWorld SEE Centre.

The SEE portal is available in 4 languages - Macedonian, Albanian, English and South Slavic (which groups together Croatian, Serbian and Bosnian). Each of these editions is autonomous in aiming to provide information relevant to local civil society.

The SEE Portal has more than 150 partner organisations - NGOs and civil society groups.

Each edition has a corresponding radio page. OneWorld SEE Radio (<http://radiosee.oneworld.net>) provides a portal with audio clips and programmes uploaded and shared among some 130 partner radio stations from the region. Recently, a Roma language edition has been added.

The decision on creation of new language editions (in Bulgarian, Romanian, Hungarian and Roma) is pending on the decision of the SEE Centre board, which will be formed at the end of next year. This project is funded by HIVOS. *Dunja Vujadinovic, Partnership manager and Project coordinator assistant*

OneWorld United States offers U.S. audiences a more in-depth and balanced view of the world than what is available in most news coverage in the U.S. and provides partnerships, services and outreach to American nonprofits that share OneWorld's values.

After our sustainability planning process in 2003, the OWUS team redesigned and re-launched partnership services in late 2003/early 2004. We now have improved monthly partner news, new partner promotional materials, a partner starter kit and orientation, in addition to our ongoing content highlighting and peer learning services. As of August 2004, OWUS has 82 partners, all of whom are now dues-paying. We also have a partner advisory committee to help us deepen our engagement with them and refine our activities to be of greater relevance to the field. We have been focused in 2004 on redesigning our editorial products (our daily headlines service, website and unique syndication on Yahoo! World News) to spur our American readers to deepen their understanding of international development and human rights issues and take meaningful actions in an interdependent world. Through trainings and joint events, we have deepened our engagement with U.S. partners and promoted collective initiatives to increase our common effectiveness. Finally, we are recruiting a new board and are securing independent tax-exempt status so that OneWorld U.S. can continue to play a strong role in the OneWorld network. *Michael Litz, Director*

OneWorld UK became a live OWI Ltd project once more in September 2003, under Miles Litvinoff’s management. Editor Josie Kirby helped create a freshly designed, high quality UK edition, launched in March 2004, and partnership manager Ghada Osman assisted in the vital process of rebuilding relationships with UK partners, raising the number of paying partners to 48 by mid-August and recruiting 54 new partners, bringing the total to 260. Miles also made a start on income generation, with advertising bringing in £1.5k and sponsorship £1k. Audience figures ranged from 4,600-6,000 unique visitors.

In September 2004, Anuradha Vittachi was appointed Centre Director, charged with creating an autonomous UK centre during 2005; Bill Gunyon took over as the editorial lynchpin, and a semi-voluntary team has gathered rapidly around them. The team’s plans, outlined

in the ‘Blueprint for a Sustainable UK’, focus on mobilising UK citizens, especially younger ones: links with students, youth clubs and children’s networks are being strengthened - and Tiki the Penguin is flying back. Mobile phones and social movements (e.g. MDG, WSF, Making Poverty History) will play important roles in the mix of awareness and action. By December 2004, audience figures had multiplied fivefold. The UK team will soon incorporate other OWI Ltd projects as the decentralising process unfolds. *Anuradha Vittachi - Centre Director*

Partnership is essential to our mission. All OneWorld centres engage with a wider community of partner organisations working for global justice. Engaging with partners at country and regional levels, as well as internationally, ensures that our work has a strong local dimension while retaining the reach of a global network. OneWorld’s core activity of highlighting partners’ news and analysis on our web pages brings a growing global audience to our partners’ websites.

During the past year, the number of partners in the OneWorld community grew steadily. The total figure passed 1,600, based in 89 countries, in early 2003, in addition to hundreds of OneWorld Radio and OneWorld TV members. We will continue to listen and respond to our partners, so that we can address civil society’s priorities as effectively as possible through our work.

Our thematic channels, mainly edited from OneWorld centres in the South, give global perspectives on critical issues facing the human family.

AIDS CHANNEL

In the past year, the channel updates were approximately 10 stories a week in addition to the monthly editorials and guest columns. The channel has covered stories on a huge range of AIDS subjects with the most prolific being Iran News, AllAfrica.com, Guardian (UK), International Planned Parenthood Foundation, India Social, Global Health Council, Kaiser Network, Journalists Against AIDS (Nigeria) and Daily Mail and Guardian (SA).

Featured guest columnists for the past year include, Mikel Toms, an artist and AIDS advocate, Chinua Akukwe and Melvin Foote, Elizabeth Thompson Serlmitsos and Nils Daulaire.

Of notable significance is the number of stories that were uploaded on the site on World AIDS Day 2003: 30 items were highlighted on this day, a figure much higher than on any other HIV/AIDS site.

The past year also saw the beginning of the process of review of the AIDS Channel. The idea is to move the AIDS Channel away from being an in-house OW product towards being a genuinely collaborative product. The two main factors supporting this are the belief that the channel can only be financially sustainable as a collaborative exercise, not an exclusive OW product; and the belief that the channel has not lived up to its aspiration to be an 'online community', and that this can only be put right through the active involvement of stakeholders. The revised channel implementation on the EZ CMS was scheduled for 2004.

DIGITAL OPPORTUNITY CHANNEL

The Digital Opportunity Channel, launched in collaboration with the Digital Divide Network, carved out a niche for itself as one of the leading global ICT for development portals. The channel got a new look and

depth of content when it was re-launched on the new content management system (CMS) to be a space that demonstrates how ICT can be best used to end poverty and encourage sustainable human development.

The Channel attempted for the first time to influence ICT policy-making by using online discussion platform Dgroups. The discussion forum, Information Society: Voices from the South, was launched with a partner organisation, Bytesforall, to reflect the collective voice of the Southern civil society at the global summit. At the final summit in Geneva, Benton Foundation and OneWorld South Asia jointly presented the outcome of this highly successful discussion forum. Another forum, on Gender and ICTs, was launched in collaboration with partner CSDMS.

The moderators were briefed about the Channel and its goals in two workshops held in Delhi in June and December. These workshops sought to initiate the moderators into online and web-based advocacy and policy influencing process and then review the process and experience.

LEARNING CHANNEL

With a partnership base of 500+ organisations, Learningchannel.org, emerged as a OneWorld Channel strengthening the Channel's endeavours to showcase how education is the key to development. Learningchannel.org evolved into a collaborative online space to lobby for education rights by launching two highly successful discussion forums. The outcome of the first discussion forum, Education for Youth and Employment, was presented at the Hyderabad Regional Summit of the Global Youth Employment Summit and the outcome document was submitted to the Ministerial Panel drafting the Hyderabad Blueprint. Another forum on the Right to Education slogan was launched in collaboration with the Global Campaign for Education and the South African Democratic Teachers Union. Learning Channel.org also supported BytesforAll in running their existing education mailing lists: Education India and Literacy India, on the Dgroups platform.

He has also made small additions to the site, such as Tiki's Picks, a series of changing links to amusing poems, jokes and pictures as well as to topical sections of his more serious guides on global issues. With a small amount of funding recently made available, Tiki is ready to embark on more ambitious projects, designed to stimulate even more interaction with kids from around the world.

ITRAIN ONLINE

The ItrainOnline website, created by a consortium of NGOs, provides downloadable training material for self-tuition and training on a number of ICT topics - from how to use email to how to digitise audio or build a website.

Itrainonline had FAO and UNESCO join the consortium, each bringing their significant experience in capacity building. Itrainonline finalised its modular format for production and re-packaging of training materials, which has been adopted by a number of projects working in ICT training. Most of the materials created using this format can be found on the UNESCO supported MultiMediaToolkit (MMTK) section of ItrainOnline.

OneWorld Radio

OneWorld Radio has grown to service over 1,600 members, and it has diversified within the OneWorld Network to include 8 language sites [English, French, Spanish, Portuguese, South Slav, Macedonian, Albanian, Roma], 2 regional sites [OneWorld Radio South East Europe, and OneWorld Radio Africa] and a thematic site focusing on HIV/AIDS [OneWorld Radio AIDS Network]. In January 2004 a pilot edition for South Asia was produced, and a full edition for this region is anticipated.

Servicing the membership base of broadcasters and NGOs from around the world has been one of the main areas of focus, and new features have been developed; for example new sections on content ideas, evaluation and research. A 'matching' service, linking northern and southern members has also been initiated and has proved popular.

The sharing of audio online has been increasing across all OneWorld Radio sites. By March 2004, 3,595 audio pieces in 33 languages had been uploaded. Knowledge sharing has also proved to be a valued aspect of the OneWorld Radio online community, with general users and members learning about best practices and listening to and reading about how other communicators have tackled issues such as HIV/AIDS in programming.

Providing training and support for southern broadcasters has been an important aspect of OneWorld Radio activity in this period. Through the CATIA (Catalysing Access to Technology in Africa) programme, OneWorld Radio and OneWorld Africa have established a dynamic team who is training and serving members in Senegal, Uganda and Zambia. The three institutional partners within CATIA - OneWorld, AMARC and PANOS - have supported and supplemented each other in providing equipment, networking, training and content development.

In 2004, OneWorld Radio is consolidating its delivery of language, regional and thematic sites, and deepening its role as a multimedia content source for all OneWorld sites.

OneWorld TV

Video on the internet is a growth area and OneWorld TV is at the forefront of using this powerful tool to communicate issues of human rights and social justice to a global audience. OneWorld TV continues to work with film makers and journalists to upload video clips and highlight important stories that are ignored by a globalised mainstream media. OneWorld TV now has more than 5,000 members from 99 countries and the community is growing.

In OneWorld TV's unique format of collaborative storytelling, viewers can watch a series of 2-3 minute clips grouped by subject. They can choose their own storylines in an interactive exploration of global issues. The site is a public space on the web for dialogue, debate and discussion. It provides a platform for the established documentary maker as well as the participatory video maker who is often working with rougher but more immediate footage in community projects.

In 2003/4, OneWorld TV launched its Young Video Journalists initiative in which the team worked with young VJs covering international social and political conferences. This initiative took place at the World Summit on the Information Society in Geneva in December 2003, at the World Social Forum in Mumbai, India, in January 2004, and at the 1st Americas Social Forum in Quito, Ecuador, in July 2004. On each occasion, young video journalists shot, edited and uploaded their pieces daily on the internet, creating vibrant video diaries from each forum.

Partnerships are an important cornerstone of OneWorld TV's development. This year, OneWorld TV and Radio have worked with MTV's HIV/AIDS campaign to engage young people worldwide in a competition to mark World AIDS Day. OneWorld TV also works with The Community Channel in the UK to provide a broadcast outlet for films made by OWTV's members so that life at the grassroots is showcased in the 'Community World' strand.

MONITORING & EVALUATION

An important milestone in terms of monitoring and evaluation was achieved in November 2003, when OneWorld adopted a General Framework for Evaluation. This framework aims to guide the monitoring and evaluation activities of the OneWorld network, ensuring that results can be measured on the level of OneWorld as a whole. It also makes findings comparable among the different centres, each of which is responsible for its own data gathering.

In early 2004, a key step was taken in the implementation of the general framework by way of a network wide audience survey. Its results are highlighted below and serve as an important input for OneWorld’s media strategy.

OneWorld is not only concerned with the satisfaction of, and impact on, its website audiences: assessing the quality of the services delivered to our partners is equally important. Different centres use different methods for getting feedback from their partners. OneWorld South Asia organises a partnership meeting every year, while OneWorld US has gone through a process of interviews and surveys to assess which services partners appreciate most. They have now redesigned their partnership packages accordingly.

Furthermore, an important monitoring tool has been built into the CMS (Content Management System), which allows us to measure the amount of traffic we send to the websites of our partners by highlighting their content on OneWorld. These data are also accessible to the partners themselves.

In 2003, OneWorld conducted case study research among a selection of 20 of its partners in South Asia, Southern Africa and Central America. The research aimed to find out how exactly people and organisations in the South benefit from the use of ICTs. The studies describe how the use of digital technologies can empower people and increase their opportunities, while at the same time observing that the sustainability of these initiatives is problematic. The case study reports were launched at the

World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS) and its results presented in different fora afterwards. They are available at <http://www.digitalopportunity.org/article/archive/4853>.

Audience Survey: “I value OneWorld as...”

For online portals such as OneWorld, it is critical to know our audience. The importance of regular and timely audience research – as a means to understand how we are accomplishing our mission and how our actions are in line with our partners’ and users’ expectations – cannot be overstated. Because we are a network with a global presence, we are also aware of the importance of knowing how we are performing at the network level, and whether there are significant differences between the centres, the editions and the regions within which we operate.

OneWorld carried out its first network-wide online audience survey between January 26 and February 27, 2004. The response rate was overwhelming: 2,700 people took part in the survey, with 50% saying that they would be willing to participate in further research. This is about 20% of the recipients of our email newsletters.

By far the most important and encouraging finding is that almost half of our audience have taken some sort of action as the result of visiting one of the OneWorld sites. Combine this with their high appreciation of our content as global, value-based, and direct from the South, and we can therefore confidently state that we do have an impact on our audience and that we are providing an alternative to the mainstream media, something which we feel is especially important today.

In addition to seeing OneWorld as a trusted source of news, more than 40% of the respondents value OneWorld as a global partner network of NGOs. This appreciation of our work as a platform to bring together a global community working for sustainable development is further reflected in the composition of our audience: about 30% works in the non-profit sector and 50% are affiliated with an NGO.

The opinions expressed by our audience about stories carried on our sites are very positive. When asked what

makes OneWorld different from mainstream media, more global coverage (57%); stories directly from non-profit organisations (55%); different stories (42%); and independence from regular news outlets (39%) score as the highest reasons.

Finally, it is encouraging to see that 79% of our audience visit the sites of our partners (48% of respondents occasionally click through to a partner site from an article on OneWorld and 31% do this regularly).

The survey clearly shows we are meeting our aim of effectively informing a global audience about

human rights and sustainable development. And we are global – with much higher-than-average audiences in both Asia and Africa. However, our services could be improved and we will undertake efforts to follow up on recommendations to make our sites more interactive, to continue expanding the geographic and linguistic reach of our sites and to broaden the composition of our audience.

OPEN KNOWLEDGE NETWORK

The Open Knowledge Network (OKN) is an initiative of the G8 Digital Opportunity Taskforce (DOT Force) linking together existing grassroots information and knowledge sharing initiatives. Its aim is to promote both the creation and exchange of local content as widely as possible across the South, supported by a range of different ICTs.

In 2002, the UK and Canadian governments committed funding to an initial three-year programme, enabling the setting up of a network of organisations using common software to exchange content in ways that enable ordinary people in the South to use the content practically in their everyday lives. OneWorld International supports the OKN programme and works closely with OneWorld Africa, OneWorld South Asia and a range of partner organisations.

Today, OKN has activities in Kenya/Tanzania (working with ALIN and AfriAfya), Senegal (working with ENDA CyberPOP) and Zimbabwe (working with SAFIRE). By the end of the year OKN will be starting up in several other African countries. In India the OKN Hub partner is MSSRF. OKN works with some of MSSRF's Village Knowledge Centres in Pondicherry, using the Tamil language. In 2004/5, OKN will start activities in North India and in Sri Lanka, too. There is also some activity, but no ongoing project as such, in Latin America. OKN has begun networking with a range of organisations in the region with the aim of identifying their needs in the area of local content creation and exchange.

OneWorld, IICD, IDRC, the Berkman Center of Harvard Law School, Accenture and MSSRF are the founding partners of OKN and they now comprise the OKN Steering Committee. OKN aims to establish an independent governance structure comprising its partner organisations, which will be implemented in Africa during 2004/5.

Using the OKN system, people in Africa, Asia and, hopefully soon, Latin America can create digital content in their own language, which is then exchanged with

others through networks of existing community Access Points staffed by what OKN calls 'Community Reporters'.

Community reporters play a very important role in OKN, serving as 'infomediaries', and linking the community with OKN and vice versa. Reporters carry out content needs analyses in their communities, assist in content generation and dissemination, and link the OKN system to other community media as well as to key people and organisations in the community. Using a wide range of community dissemination tools, such as radio, drama, puppetry and simple drawings, is very important to increase the impact of OKN.

The Access Points channel their content to and from 'Hub' organisations for wider exchange. As most of the Access Points are not online on a regular basis, exchanging information with the Hubs happens with the help of a range of technologies including satellite transfer (WorldSpace) or short bursts of email or internet connectivity. The content is disseminated using conventional means such as Radio and newsletters as well as modern technologies since OKN is designed to be compatible with all kinds of information and communication technologies.

The Hubs are located in existing organisations that support the exchange of knowledge at the grassroots level, and are staffed by what OKN calls 'Knowledge Workers' (a mixture of sub-editor, electronic librarian and development worker). The Hubs are linked to each other through shared standards and open source software tools.

To extend the potential of this human network, OKN is also working with mobile phones as a new two-way channel to encourage communities to create and share vital, up-to-date messages cheaply and quickly. The mobile arm of OKN is funded by the Vodafone Group Foundation and the first pilot went live in Kenya in June 2004 with a Community News Service, including health tips, community events and job opportunities. Other services in the pipeline include AIDS/HIV Question and Answer services and similar services for employment opportunities.

Open Source communications solutions

During the year, OneWorld continued to offer comprehensive consultancy and software production services to partners and other civil society organisations working to build a better world. As a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to building online communities for global justice, OneWorld brought a unique approach to the role of the internet in delivering strategic objectives.

In 2002 OneWorld developed an open source Content Management System (CMS) specifically for the non-profit sector. Based on eZ Publish, the CMS underpins OneWorld's relaunched websites and is now available to like-minded organisations. Our system enables editors based in several locations to work together to create web publications, and it also provides discussion forums, automatic email digests of web content, visitor/membership databases, and other interactive features.

OneWorld has developed and deployed a range of internet applications for itself and for other civil society organisations:

- **Index, catalogue and search:** Spider software 'reads' documents within an organisation or anywhere on the internet; then an intelligent search engine mines the information for you.
- **Knowledge management:** Track, manage and share knowledge assets; maintain directories of organisations and contacts, project databases, central repositories for
